## **ADMINISTRATOR`S GUIDE**

These pages are partly very technical. You should read the User Guide before to understand the basic concept and the goals of Orthos. This document describes how to create and administrate groups and users, architectures, domains, machines, machine groups, serial console types, systems and enclosures, vendors and platforms. Furthermore, the administration of the Orthos server will be discussed.

## 1.1 Installation/Setup (Production system)

#### 1. Install the orthos2 package:

\$ zypper install orthos2

2. Change nginx user to orthos:

In /etc/nginx/nginx.conf add user orthos orthos; to the beginning of the file

- 3. Enter the correct server name to the nginx server conf: In /etc/nginx/conf.d/orthos2\_nginx.conf replace 127.0.0.1 in the server\_name directive with the fqdn of the orthos2 server
- 4. Deploy code to database

orthos-admin migrate

- 5. Install fixtures (push data to database):
  - a. In case of a fresh install Load data from package data:

orthos-admin loaddata /usr/share/orthos2/fixtures/data/\*.json /usr/share/ →orthos2/fixtures/taskmanager/\*.json

b. In case you want to load data from another orthos instance where you previously dumped data tables:

orthos-admin loaddata "dumped\_table.json"

#### 6. Create a superuser

orthos-admin createsuperuser

### 7. Create html files from templates

orthos-admin collectstatic

#### 8. start all services

## **1.2 Server Configuration**

Here the Orthos settings are defined and the Orthos server behavior is adjusted. The setting options are usually self-explanatory by their names.

### 1.2.1 domain.validendings

List of valid network domain endings. All FQDN's must match at least one of these. Multiple endings can be separated by a comma.

Leave empty if all domains should be accepted.

Default: example.de, example.com

Example: example.de, example.com, example.bayern

#### 1.2.2 mail.from.address

Sender field of the emails sent by Orthos.

Default: orthos-noreply@domain.de

#### 1.2.3 mail.smtprelay.fqdn

The SMTP server that is used to send mails. That should be a company-internal server.

Default: relay.mail-server.de

#### 1.2.4 mail.subject.prefix

Subject prefix of the emails sent by Orthos. Each mail gets the prefix before the subject itself (e.g.: [ORTHOS] Orthos password restored).

A whitespace after the prefix is recommended.

Default: [ORTHOS] < whitespace >

#### 1.2.5 orthos.api.welcomemessage

Orthos can show you a welcome message, this can be set here. Default: blank

## 1.2.6 orthos.bugreport.url

The path to the online repo is set here. If errors occur in the Orthos code, they can be reported there. Default: https://gitlab.suse.de/orthos-maintainers/orthos2/issues

## 1.2.7 orthos.cli.url

The path to the Orthos command line interface. Default: https://build.suse.de/package/show/Devel:Archteam:Orthos/orthos-cli

## 1.2.8 orthos.configuration.inline.begin

It marks the beginning of a code inserted from Orthos configuration into a configuration files. Example: #—BEGIN ORTHOS SECTION –

## 1.2.9 orthos.configuration.inline.end

It marks the ending of a code inserted from Orthos configuration into a configuration files. Example: #—END ORTHOS SECTION –

### 1.2.10 orthos.debug.dhcp.write

Here the writing of the DHCP configuration can be activated or deactivated.

### 1.2.11 orthos.debug.mail.send

Here you can activate or deactivate the writing of Orthos Info E-Mails.

### 1.2.12 orthos.debug.motd.write

Here you can activate or deactivate that Orthos the motto of the day when installing a machine.

### 1.2.13 orthos.debug.serialconsole.write

Here the writing of a cscsreen configuration file on the screen server can be activated or deactivated via Orthos.

#### 1.2.14 orthos.debug.setup.execute

Here you can activate or deactivate the writing of the machine installation files via Orthos.

#### 1.2.15 orthos.documentation.url

The path to the Orthos documentation.

Default: https://gitlab.suse.de/orthos-maintainers/orthos2/tree/development/docs

#### 1.2.16 orthos.web.welcomemessage

Here you can enter the Orthos welcome message.

Default: blank

#### 1.2.17 racktables.url.query

Orthos retrieves the location of a machine via Racktables. It is important to have at least set orthos\_id#{ $\{ id \}$ } at the end of the call, only then can Racktable find the appropriate machine.

Default: https://orthos.arch.suse.de/cgi-bin/get\_location\_from\_racktables.pl?orthos\_id#{{
id }}

#### 1.2.18 remotepower.default.password

Default password for remote power access.

#### 1.2.19 remotepower.default.username

Default user for remote power access.

#### 1.2.20 remotepower.dominionpx.password

Password for remote Power Distribution Unit(Dominion PX) access.

Default: xxxxxxx

## 1.2.21 remotepower.dominionpx.username.

User for remote Power Distribution Unit(Dominion PX) access. Default: orthos

### 1.2.22 remotepower.ipmi.command

Path and command to power cycle over baseboard management controller (ipmitool).

Default: /usr/bin/ipmitool -I lanplus -H {{ machine.bmc.fqdn }} -U {{ ipmi.user }} -P {{ ipmi.password }} power {{ action }}

#### 1.2.23 remotepower.ipmi.password

Password for remote power access over baseboard management controller.

Default: xxxxxxx

#### 1.2.24 remotepower.ipmi.username

User for remote power access over baseboard management controller. Default: oroot

### 1.2.25 remotepower.sentry.password

Password for remote Remote Power Manager(sentry) access. Default: xxxxxxx

#### 1.2.26 remotepower.sentry.username

User for remote Remote Power Manager(sentry) access. Default: orthos

## 1.2.27 serialconsole.ipmi.password

Password for serial over LAN(SOL) over the baseboard management controller. Default: xxxxxx

#### 1.2.28 serialconsole.ipmi.username

User for serial over LAN(SOL) over the baseboard management controller.

Default: oroot

## 1.2.29 serialization.output.directory

Local directory where the machine object copies are stored after deleting a machine (see [Ma-chines](./adminguide/machine.md) for more information).

Default: /tmp

Example: /usr/share/grave

#### 1.2.30 serialization.output.format

Data format for the machine object copies after deleting a machine. Valid formats are json and yaml (see *Machines* for more information).

Default: json

Example: yaml

#### 1.2.31 setup.execute.command

Here you can store a script that executes Orthos during installation.

Example: /srv/tftpboot/grub2/scripts/setup.py -mac {{ machine.mac\_address }} -fqdn {{ machine.fqdn }} -arch {{ machine.architecture.name }} -default {{ choice }} -kernel-options "{{ machine.kernel\_options }}" {% if machine.serialconsole %}-serial-console true -serial-baud {{ machine.serialconsole.baud\_rate }} -serial-line {{ machine.serialconsole.kernel\_device }}{% else %}-serial-console false{% endif %}

### 1.2.32 ssh.keys.paths

File path(s) to private SSH keys. Multiple paths can be separated by a comma. In production mode (running e.g on Apache webserver), absolute paths should be used. Each SSH connection tries all keys until one of them matches.

Default: ./keys/orthos2-master-test

Example: /root/.ssh/id\_rsa\_cobbler\_server, /root/.ssh/id\_rsa\_sconsole

## 1.2.33 ssh.scripts.local.directory

Local directory holding scripts determined for remote execution (e.g. for machine checks).

Default: ./scripts

## 1.2.34 ssh.scripts.remote.directory

Remote directory where scripts get copied before they get run on the remote system. Default: /tmp/orthos-scripts

### 1.2.35 ssh.timeout.seconds

Set the SSH connecting timeout (in seconds). Default: 10

### 1.2.36 tasks.daily.executiontime

Time at which the daily tasks are started. Must be in 24h format. Default: 00:00

### 1.2.37 virtualization.libvirt.images.directory

Here stores Orthos the images for the virtual machines.

Default: /mounts/users-space/archteam/orthos-vm-images

## 1.2.38 virtualization.libvirt.ovmf.path

Here is the path for the KVM Support UEFI Binary defined. Default: usr/share/qemu/ovmf-x86\_64-opensuse.bin

#### 1.2.39 websocket.cscreen.command

Local command which gets executed when a serial console gets requested. The service appends the hostname to the command (e.g. /usr/bin/screen host). The command can be anything returning a terminal (see websockets for more information).

Default: /usr/bin/screen

### 1.2.40 websocket.port

The port on which the WebSocket service is listening (see websockets) for more information).

Default: 8010

## 1.3 WebSockets

#### 1.3.1 Serial console in the web browser

Orthos provides the ability to use an interactive serial console in the web browser for each machine that has an entry for a serial console. The WebSocket communication protocol is used for this. To start the WebSocket service, the following command line must be executed (no HTTPS/TLS):

```
$ orthos-admin serialconsole-ws --start
Start websocket daemon on port 8010...
```

With HTTPS/TLS:

```
$ orthos-admin serialconsole-ws --start --wss\
    --crt <certificate>\
    --key <key>
Start websocket daemon on port 8010...
```

Example:

```
$ orthos-admin serialconsole-ws --start --wss\
    --crt /etc/apache2/ssl.crt/orthos.network.tld.crt\
    --key /etc/apache2/ssl.key/orthos.network.tld.pem
Start websocket daemon on port 8010...
```

Further configuraton information can be found in the Administrator's Guide (websocket.\*).

When the service establishes a SSH connection to invoke a command on a remote server, a SSH key without password is recommended. The key path just needs to be added to the SSH command (-i <identity\_file>).

The output is available in the machine view under the tab Serial Console.

This feature was tested with Chromium Version 62.0.3202.89 (64-bit) and Firefox 52.5.0 (64-bit).

## 1.4 Tokens

Usually no administration is required for tokens. When users use the command line client for the first time, they must authenticate themselves with the user / password, after which a token is written for the user. After the process, it is no longer necessary to log on via CLI, since this is then done via the token.

## **1.5 Machines**

Machines are the elementary objects in Orthos. They are entities like Servers, Desktop PCs, Virtual Machines (VM), Baseboard Management Controller (BMC), Remote Power devices etc. Machines can be administrative in order to serve as serial console, DHCP server etc. Administrative machines typically are productive and must not be touched. Users are able to reserve machine objects. The following figure shows the machine object organization in general:

## 1.5.1 Machine fields description

#### **FQDN** (required)

The fully qualified domain name must be DNS resolvable by the Orthos server. The domain must be valid according to the valid domain endings configured in Server Configurations (key domain.validendings).

Example: bach.arch.suse.de

#### Enclosure

The corresponding enclosure object. A enclosure object represents the physical chassis of a machine. If no enclosure object is selected, a new object will be created (using the machines hostname).

Example: bach

#### MAC address (required)

Media Access Control address (MAC) of the primary network interface. This address is used for e.g. DHCP configuration.

Example: 3C:A8:2A:10:74:C3

#### Architecture (required)

The architecture of the machine. The architecture should be equal to uname -m output of the Linux system running in the machine-to-be.

Example: x86\_64

#### System (required)

The type of system of the machine.

Example: VM, BMC, BareMetal, LPAR, Desctop, RemotePower etc.

#### Serial number/Product code/Platform

Specified by the manufacturer. Mostly there is a sticker with the serial number and the product code on the machine's chassis, which has to be entered here.

Example: Serial number: GPKLDV6120104 / Product code: MAKL1K1PFB / Platform: Knights Landing

#### **Kernel option**

Kernel options are passed via boot loader to the kernel. New values can be set here, or appended with a plus (+). You can find explanations of the kernel options in the GRUB 2 documentation.

#### Administrative machine

Important and productive administration servers inside the orthos network environment like DHCP, remote power switches, etc. "Do not touch"!

Example: RemotePower, SerialConsole, DHCP Server etc.

#### **NDA Hardware**

It marks machines from the Non-disclosure Agreement (NDA) program. Do not publish any details of these machines! If you exchange info like lspci or whatever hardware specifics, make sure that the bug you post this info in is marked private and people are aware of the sensitivity of the data you post/send.

#### Active

Machine is active and can be used from everybody. If deactivated (adminstrator rights needed), the machine is hidden for ordinary users.

#### **Dedicated VM host**

It marks whether the machine can be used as VM host in Orthos. VM guests can then be created on the machine and again managed by Orthos.

#### **Delete automatically**

Determine whether the VM Guest is deleted after the end of the reservation.

#### Max VMs

Maximum number of possible guest systems on the VM host. The number of VM guests depends on the hardware properties of the host.

#### Virtualization API

The solution that provides virtualization on the host system. Example: libvirt etc.

#### **Check connectivity**

Determined whether and how Orthos checks the accessibility of the machine.

Example: Ping, SSH or SSH with login

#### **Collect system information**

Orthos can scan the machines and make them available to the system for information. Example: dmesg, dmicode etc.

#### DHCPv4

How to handle the DHCPv4 server v4. Example: exclude, write DHCPv4 record or ignore DHCPv4 request

#### DHCPv6

How to handle the DHCPv6 server v6. Example: exclude, write DHCPv6 record or ignore DHCPv6 request

#### **DHCP** filename

Here you can store a machine-specific boot file for PXE and UEFI. See also the GRUB2 documentation.

## 1.5.2 SERIAL CONSOLE description

#### Туре

Access type to the serial console of the machine. Example: Telnet, IPMI, free command etc

#### **CScreen server**

A cscreen server is a server on which the cscreen service is installed and entered. Example: sconsole1.arch.suse.de

#### **Baud rate**

Serial console transfer rate. Example: 115200, 57600, 9600

#### **Kernel device**

Kernel device on which the kernel outputs the serial signal. Example: 0, 1 etc.

#### **Management BMC**

Here a BMC for serial over lan can be selected, it must be created similar to a machine.

Example: bahama-sp.arch.suse.de

#### **Dedicated console server**

A dedicated console server is an embedded device which is only for merging multiple consoles and then deploying. Access is via telnet. Access to the console runs via the CScreen srever.

Example: sconsole3.arch.suse.de

#### Device

Kernel device through which the output for the serial console runs. Example: ttyS0, ttyS1 etc.

#### Port

Network port for accessing the serial console.

#### Command

A free command can be entered here. Example: telnet sconsole3.arch.suse.de 2008

## 1.5.3 REMOTE POWER description

#### Туре

Access type to the RemotePower console of the machine. Example: Telnet, IPMI etc.

#### **Management BMC**

BMC can be selected, it must be created similar to a machine. Example: bahama-sp.arch.suse.de

#### **Remote power device**

Here a RemotePower device can be selected, it must be created similar to a machine. Example: rpower1.arch.suse.de

#### Port

Network port for accessing the RemotePower.

#### Comment

Comment indicating the remote power device.

## 1.5.4 Delete a machine

To delete a machine, choose from the machine list and press 'Delete' at the bottom of the machine view. All related information that is also deleted together with the machine object is displayed. Press Yes to confirm. For administrative reasons, a copy of each deleted machine object is stored in the form of a file. The format (JSON, Yaml) as well as the target directory can be set via the server configuration.

Further configuration information can be found in the Administrator's Guide (serialization.\*).

**Note:** When running in production mode, make sure the target directory (serialization.output.directory) can be written by the webserver user.

## **1.6 Architectures**

Machine architectures can be set up, the most common ones are already preconfigured. Machine objects have an architecture that can then be mapped to the machine.

## 1.6.1 Architecture fields description

#### Name (required)

Name of the architecture.

Example: s390x, x86\_64, ppc64le etc.

#### **DHCP** filename

Path to the boot files on the TFTP server.

#### **Contact email**

Email address to the person who is the contact person for an architecture.

#### Write DHCPv4

Enable/disable writing a DHCPv4 file for this architecture.

#### Write DHCPv6

Enable/disable writing a DHCPv6 file for this architecture.

## 1.7 Domains

Here you can set up a domain under Orthos, a domain must also be set up on a DNS server. That Orthos can install machines, it is absolutely necessary to specify the DHCP server, TFTP server and the architectures. Orthos is able to write the DHCP file for these domains. The FQDN of a machine object is bound to a domain.

## 1.7.1 Domain fields description

#### Name (required)

The domain name must be a valid domain, this has to be stored on the DNS and the domain must be valid according to the valid domain endings configured in Server Configurations (key domain.validendings).

Example: Key: suse.de, suse.cz

#### **DHCP Server**

Responsible DHCP server for the domain.

Example: music.arch.suse.de

#### **TFTP Server**

TFTP server from which you are installing your machines. Here, for example, are: Grub2 files, Installation Scripts, Installation Images, Autoyast files and so on.

Example: music.arch.suse.de

#### **Setup architectures**

A domain can contain several architectures, for these a corresponding DHCP file is then written and the appropriate installation files and scripts are offered.

Example: x86\_64, ppc64le, s390x

#### Setup machine groups

Here it is possible to add machine groups.

## **1.8 Systems and Enclosures**

#### 1.8.1 Systems

Systems are assigned to the machines accordingly, here the type of machine is determined. Most known systems are already stored in Orthos.

System fields description:

#### Name (required)

Exact name of the system.

Example: BMC, Desktop, LPAR PowerPC etc.

#### Virtual

Use this if the system a virtual system (VM Gast).

#### **Administrative**

Machines that are declared as administrative are machines that belong to the Orthos system and network management. These machines cannot be reserved by the user.

Example: RemotePower

## 1.8.2 Enclosures

Under Enclosures the case (unit) is defined. A parent name for a unit with several devices can be defined. Several machines can then be assigned to the enclosure. If you create a machine object and you do not specify an enclosure, the name of the enclosure is formed from the FQDN of the machine.

System fields description:

#### Name (required)

Name of the Enclosure.

#### Platform

Here the machine platform is specified, this usually comes via the vendor.

#### Description

Since Enclosure is the generic term of a complete system, this should be as precise as possible.

## **1.9 Vendors and Platforms**

Under Vendors you can enter the machine manufacturer, This serves together with the platforms to recognize a machine or machines of the same type. Most manufacturers are already stored in the Orthos system. With platforms you can set the machine family name (unit name). It goes hand in hand with the vendor, the platform name is determined by the vendor.

## 1.9.1 Vendor fields description

#### Name (required)

Name of the vendor.

Example: AMD, IBM, Raritan, Dell, Intel, SGI etc.

## 1.9.2 Platform fields description

#### Name (required)

Name of the platform specified by the manufacturer. On x86 systems you often get an idea via dmidecode command, e.g.: `dmidecode -s system-product-name Latitude E7470`

But this info is often empty or wrong, especially on early developement machines. Therefore it has to be filled manually. It should be a meaningful name, by which people who are familiar with products of the vendor have an idea what kind of machine this is (how old, features, etc.).

#### Vendor (required)

Here a vendor is specified and the connection between platform and vendor created.

Example: AMD, IBM, Raritan, Dell, Intel, SGI etc.

#### Cartridge/Blade

If the platform is a cartridge/blade system, a hook must be set here.

#### **Description**

More information about the platform.

## 1.10 Serial Console Type

Here you can set up the different ways to access a serial console. The best known ones like IPMI, ILO2, Telnet, libvirt etc. are already predefined. The serial console type can then be converted into a machine object under: Machine > SERIAL CONSOLE > Type can be set.

In the following are the fields for the Serial Console Type with explanations.

## 1.10.1 Name (required)

Name of the Serial Console Type.

## 1.10.2 Command

Command which is required to access the serial console. In Orthos you use variables/objects to create a serial console type. These are written in double curly brackets  $\{\{ \dots \}\}$ .

Example: virsh -c lxc+ssh://root@{{ machine.hypervisor.fqdn }}/system console {{ machine. hostname }}

The objects are taken from the machine object or the respective entries at the machine. Such as, for example.

- Hostname = machine.Hostname
- BMC FQDN = machine.bmc.fqdn
- Hypervisor FQDN = machine.hypervisor.fqdn
- Console Server FQDN = console\_server.fqdn
- IPMI User = ipmi.user
- IPMI Password = ipmi.password

## 2.1 Introduction

Orthos is the machine administration tool of the development network in the ARCH team at SUSE. It is used for following tasks:

- locating a machine,
- getting the state of the machine,
- overview about the hardware,
- overview about the installed software (installations),
- reservation of the machines,
- generating the DHCP configuration,
- · reboot the machines remotely and
- managing remote consoles.

This document describes the usage. For implementation specific notes, please refer to the "Developer's Guide". However, sometimes this document describes some aspects of the implementation simply to let the user better understand why things work as they do. All users of Orthos have a very technical background.

## 2.2 Architecture




Image Overall Architecture shows the overall architecture. All data is kept in the database. The Orthos Server is the central component of Orthos. It has the following tasks:

- gathering machine data,
- communicating with the clients,
- executing jobs such as rebooting or installating the machine or syncing some files.

There are two clients: The command line interface and the web interface. While the web interface is able to deal with basic tasks such as getting a machine overview and reserving a machine, the CLI is able to deal with more complicated tasks such as executing queries and even edit the data.

## 2.3 Web Client

Via the link to your webserver domain it is possible to use the Orthos Web Client. The Web Client is mostly selfexplanatory, so only the most important things are explained. You can log in via the web client with an LDAP user account. This is a normal user and has no administrative rights. This means that it is not possible to create and delete machine objects yourself and so on. With this account it is possible to use machines.

You can:

- Search for suitable machines
- Reserve machines for you
- Install the machines you need with SLES, SLED, openSUSE Leap and openSUSE tumbleweed,...
- · Perform various machine checks
- · Get information about machines and test their accessibility
- Add annotations for each machine (Machine Features, Glitches, Hardware Upgrades, Bios Updates, etc.)
- Report Problems for each machine
- · Get an overview of the reservation history

If administrative rights are required, they must be set up by an Orthos administrator. Below a screenshot of the login page.

- Ping, SSH and Login: Sort by availability status.
- All Network Domains: Sort by network domain.
- All Machine Groups: Overview and sorting of machines in the respective machine group.

## 2.3.2 Machine Page

Each machine (machine object) has its own page here you have the possibility to get more detailed information about the machine, to request the status of a machine, to have machines scanned, to install the machine with a new OS, to open error tickets and to write annotations to the machines.

## Actions



- Reserve Machines: Here it is possible to reserve a machine under your name. In general, make sure that machines are only reserved for as long as you actually need them. A maximum of 90 days is planned. Please remember that other users may also need the machine. If you need a machine for a longer period of time, only an Orthos administrator can make reservations under your name for longer time periods, up to infinite for constant machine assignment.
- Rescan Status: Rescan the status information of a machine.
- Rescan All: Rescan all information of a machine.
- Rescan Installations: Resacan the installation status of a machine.
- Rescan Network Interfaces: Rescan the machine network interfaces.

- Setup Machine: Here you can install your machine according to your needs. You have the possibility to install SLES, SLED, Opensuse Leap, Opensuse and Tumbleweed. During the installation you have several options: install, install ssh install ssh auto, install auto etc.
- Report Problem: If you unexpectedly encounter a problem with the machine, you can create a support ticket here.



• Release Machine: This field is only for machines that are reserved under your name. Here you have the possibility to release the machine for other users.

## 2.3.3 Virtual Machines

In Orthos it is possible that you work with virtual machines. You can work with a virtual machine as well as with a bare metal machine. You can use the Power Cycle and access the console.

## 3.1 Command Line Interface (CLI)

## 3.1.1 Basics

The Orthos CLI is a simple interactive shell. You can perform following tasks with the Orthos CLI:

- execute complex queries such as "which machines have more than 4 CPUs" and are reserved by Manfred
- reserve or release a machine
- trigger installation of a machine
- view detailed machine information (such as dmidecode, lspci, lsmod or hwinfo)
- turn power on/off or just reboot a machine
- edit machine data
- Sync machines with a cobbler server
- Trigger machine data scans
- ...

## 3.1.2 Install the CLI

Python 3 is recommended.

zypper **in** orthos-client

In the Orthos Web Client you will find also the download link Download CLI to the CLI, here you have the possibility to download the suitable client for your distribution(.rpm). The button is in the top right corner.

## 3.1.3 Connecting the CLI to the Orthos Server

The CLI has several options how you can set up the connection to the Orthos server and adapt it to your needs.

## 3.1.4 Orthosrc configuration file

The orthos package installs an empty configuration file in /usr/share/doc/packages/orthos-clientorthosrc. Once you connected to the orthos server, it is recommended to copy this file to your local config directory: ~/.config/orthosrc and adapt the file to your needs.

#### **OUERY**

Retrieve all kind of information about a machine or general orthos data. This is a very powerful command. It is built up similar to a SELECT SQL database statement. In fact it ends up in querying the underlying orthos server database:

query foo, bar where binary\_attribute and int\_attribute > XY and char\_attribute =~ "STRING"

-> This will search for and show the results (also attributes): foo and bar where the condition after where matches.

Examples:

query fqdn, cpu\_physical query fqdn where cpu\_model =~ Intel query fqdn where cpu\_model =~ Intel OR !efi

More complex queries:

# Show full names and installed distributions of all machines which

The Orthos Client has many objects that you can query from the machine objects in Orthos. The names are selfexplanatory and can be used for queries as described under the *query* command above or you use the TAB completion feature to see available *query* attributes.
